The text was first published in Dom G. Legeay's *Noëls anciens* (1875-6). The earliest publication of the tune seems to be R. Grosjean's *Airs des noëls lorrain* (1862), where it is called 'Ancien air de chasse'; the old Normandy hunting tune 'Tête bizarre' is very similar, though in 6/8 time. Perhaps the most likely origin is an eighteenth-century piece in rustic style, and we have harmonized it accordingly.

PERFORMANCE (i) Solo voice (or four solo voices) and continuo; (ii) soprano and alto duet with bass viol playing the second stave throughout; (iii) choir. Ornaments: see notes, 189.
